Film Fest to Benefit Bloom Again

Red Bank - Bloom Again, a nonprofit organization that supports economically vulnerable working women when they encounter medical challenges, will host LunaFest Feb. 19 at The Two River Theater.

Lunafest is a traveling film festival featuring short films from all over the world by and about women. Bloom Again was selected by the makers of Luna Nutrition bars to bring the movie night to Monmouth County. This year's selections include "Boxedora," the story of a Cuban woman who defies Castro's ban on female fighting to follow her Olympic dream. All proceeds from the evening will benefit Bloom Again NJ and the breast cancer fund. Tickets are \$85 per person. Drinks and food are included.

Bloom Again Foundation opened its New Jersey chapter

in Red Bank last year. This month they have been able to award a caretaker from Matawan with the money she needed to pay her rent and remain in her apartment. "T" had to quit her job to care for her mother during the final stages of cancer, her rent was raised and she faced eviction. By working with Community Outreach Group in Middletown, Bloom Again was able to step in at a time of medical crisis and help "T" from falling deeper into poverty or even homelessness.

Bloom Again is partnering with several important community organizations that are helping to identify women in need including Lunch Break of Red Bank, Mary's Place by the Sea in Ocean Grove and Bayshore Family Success Center. With the help of its partners Bloom Again can become a major resource for

helping women in Monmouth County.

Bloom again was founded in Los Angeles by best-selling author and internationally renowned public speaker Lois Frankel, Ph.D., a breast cancer survivor. While recovering from cancer Frankel realized how fortunate she was compared to other women with fewer resources. Many women are one paycheck away from poverty. They scrape together what's needed to get by from paycheck to paycheck without federal assistance, but one illness in the family, a car accident, or other medical emergency is life-changing for them. Bloom Again provides a bridge in times of crisis with direct financial aid such as rent, grocery or utility payments.






